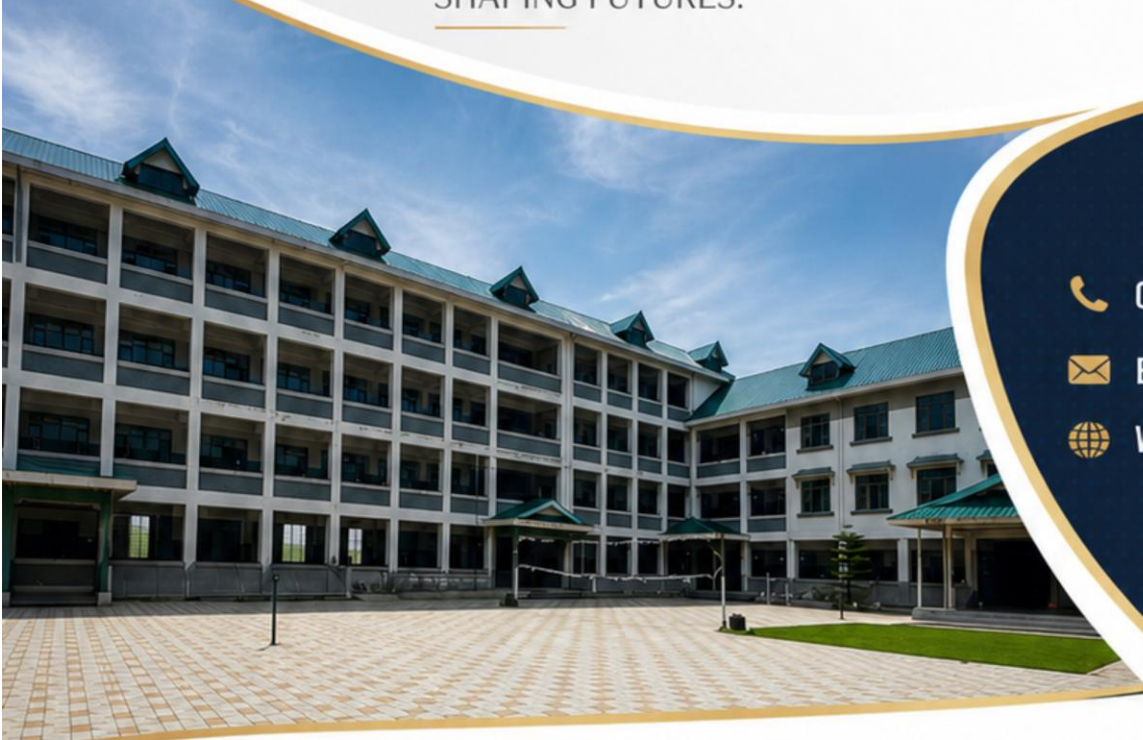

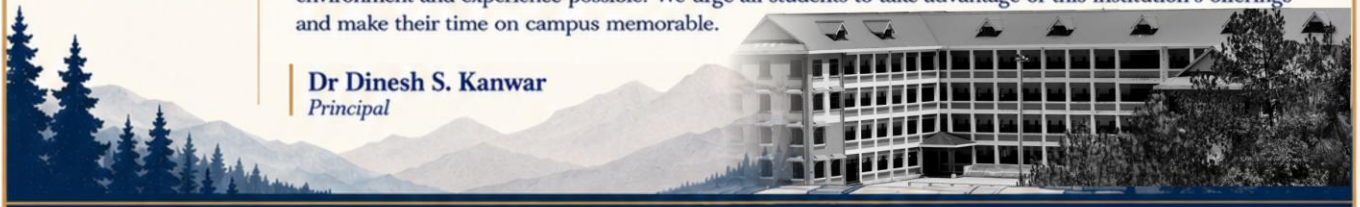
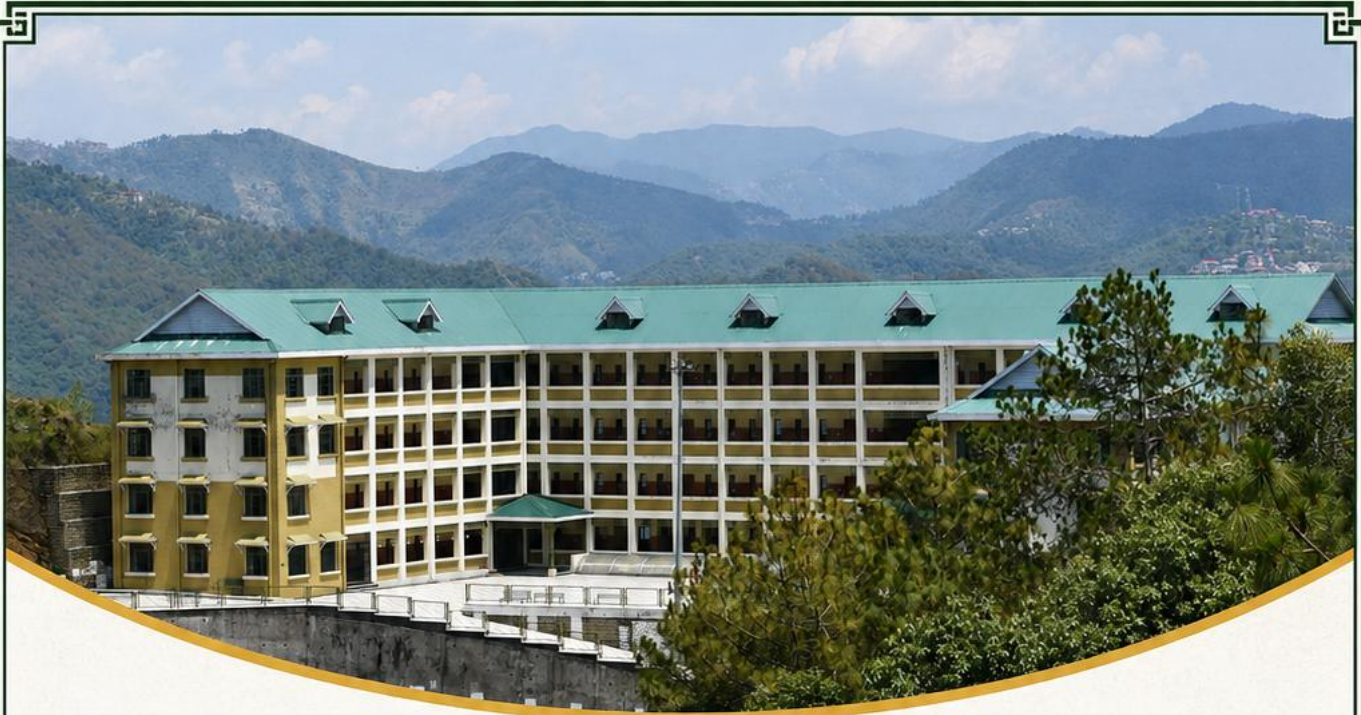

INTRODUCTION


Govt. College Dhami at 16 Mile is the only institute of tertiary education in the region providing fruits of higher education to the youth of the area. This College was announced in January 2016 by the Chief Minister of Himachal Pradesh, Late Sh. Virbhadra Singh. The official notification was issued in February 2016 vide letter no EDN-A- Ka (1)-2/2012-L-Pt Dated 15th February 2016. The College is affiliated to NAAC Accredited Grade A Himachal Pradesh University. The College is named after a place called 'Dhami' which is of historic importance. Dhami was a Princely State founded by the descendents of Prithvi Raj Chauhan in the 13th Century. It is situated 16 miles west of Shimla and has become a constituent of Himachal Pradesh in 1948.

The Dhami Prajamandal movement played a significant role in the independence of India which resulted into the famous incident known as Dhami Goli Kand. The famous festival of stones, Patharon-Ka-Mela held after Diwali is still a unique feature of Dhami's cultural life. It is a beautiful drive from Shimla towards Mandi till Solah-Meel-Ka-Mor to enter into the beautiful scenic place popularly known as Dhami. Its sheer isolation, captivating beauty, history and folklores all combined together to make it a mysterious and an irresistible place to visit. The students of this college are nurtured to become part of a vibrant ecosystem with only seven years of education saturated with rich culture and tradition.

The College possesses adequate infrastructure academic facilities including library, multipurpose hall, conference room, virtual classroom, science laboratories and well lighted class rooms. DOCUMENTS REQUIRED AT THE TIME OF ADMISSION:

1. Three passport size photographs.
2. Three copies of Matriculation certificate. Original certificates must be presented at the time of admission.
3. One copy of 10+2 Marks sheet issued by a recognized board.
4. One copy of HP domicile certificate for girl students for the exemption of tuition fee.
5. Original character certificate from head of the institution last attended in case of a student seeking admission to BA/B.Com 1st year for the 1st time.
6. A student seeking admission from a board/university other than from HPU will have to produce his/her Migration certificate (original).
7. Affidavit wherever applicable.
8. One copy of certificate of SC/ST from Magistrate Class-1 for seeking relaxation in age and benefit of reservation in the respective category.
9. One copy of Aadhar Card.(Self attested)
10. One copy of bank passbook front page (Self-attested)

Note: The character certificate must not have been issued more than six months prior to the date of admission. In case of a student who has discontinued his/her studies for one or more than one year the character certificate must be supplemented by another character certificate obtained from a Gazetted Class-1 Officer or the Panchayat Pradhan of the village. A student has to submit an affidavit for the gap year.

Admission shall not be allowed in any case to the students with compartment at 10+2 level.

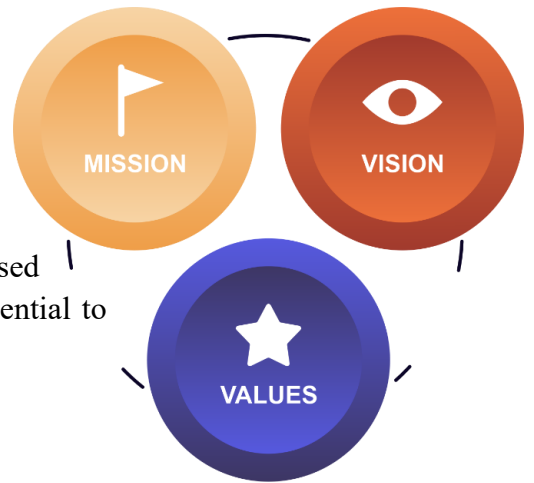

NEP 2020

As per the Notification issued by Himachal Pradesh University vide No. 7-1/2026-HPU (Acad) dated 13 May 2026 and the approval accorded by the Secretary (Education), Government of Himachal Pradesh, consequent upon the implementation of NEP-2020 for Undergraduate Programmes in the colleges of Himachal Pradesh affiliated with Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla, the new Curriculum and Credit Framework (CCF) for Undergraduate Programmes shall be implemented from the First Semester with effect from the Academic Session 2026–27, in accordance with the prescribed guidelines.

Introduction

The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 recognises that higher education plays a crucial role in promoting human and societal well-being, and in developing India as envisioned in its Constitution—a democratic, just, socially conscious, and humane nation that upholds liberty, equality, fraternity, and justice for all. The NEP 2020 notes, "given the 21st-century requirements, quality higher education must aim to develop good, thoughtful, well-rounded, and creative individuals."

The NEP 2020 states, "*Assessments of educational approaches in undergraduate education that integrate the humanities and arts with Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) have consistently shown positive learning outcomes, including increased creativity and innovation, crucial thinking and higher-order thinking capacities, problem-solving abilities, teamwork, communication skills, more in-depth learning and mastery of curricula across fields, increases in social and moral awareness, etc., besides general engagement and enjoyment of learning.*"

Further, the NEP 2020 also recommends that "*the undergraduate degree will be of either 3- or 4-year duration, with multiple exit options within this period, with appropriate certifications.*"

In accordance with the NEP 2020, the UGC has formulated a new student-centric "**Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (UGC-CCFUGP 2022)**" incorporating a flexible choice-based credit system, multidisciplinary approach, and multiple entry and exit options, which will facilitate students to pursue their career path by choosing the subject/field of their interest.

Based on the UGC-CCFUGP notified in December 2022, Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla (HPU) has developed a Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (HPU-CCFUGP, hereafter HPU-UGP), incorporating all essential aspects of the UGC-CCFUGP to facilitate the achievement of the policy visions stated in the NEP 2020. This HPU-UGP will also apply to the professional courses not covered by other regulatory bodies.

UG Degree Programmes

The UGC-CCFUGP: 3.2.3 offers various undergraduate degree programmes for students to choose from. The different UG Degree programmes are:

i. UG Degree Programmes with Single Major: A student must secure a minimum of 50% credits in the major discipline for a 3-year/4-year UG Degree to be awarded a single major.

For example:

In a 3-year UG programme, the total number of credits to be earned is 128; a student of History with 64 credits will be awarded a Bachelor of Arts in History with a single major.

Similarly, in a 4-year UG programme, the total number of credits to be earned is 168; a student of History with a minimum of 84 credits will be awarded a Bachelor of Arts (Honours or Honours with Research) in History with a single Major.

ii. UG Degree Programmes with Double Major: A student must secure a minimum of 40% credits in the second major discipline for the 3-year/4-year UG degree to be awarded a double major.

iii. Interdisciplinary Undergraduate Programmes: The credits for core courses shall be distributed among the constituent disciplines/subjects to achieve core competence in the multidisciplinary programme.

For example:

A student opts for (a) Mathematics, (b) Statistics, and (c) Physics for a UG programme. The degree for such students will be a Bachelor of Physical Science, awarded after a 3-year undergraduate programme. For such a candidate, to pursue a degree in the fourth year, they shall have to choose only one of the disciplines (A, B or C) in which they have studied 6 DSCs and 5 DSEs in the first three years. The degree will be awarded a Bachelor of Physical Sciences (Honours or Honours with Research) in Physics (if chosen Physics) for a 4-year undergraduate programme.

iv. Multidisciplinary Undergraduate Programmes: For students pursuing a multidisciplinary programme of study, the credits for core courses will be distributed across various broad disciplines, including Life Sciences, Physical Sciences, Mathematical and Computer Sciences, Data Analysis, Social Sciences, and Humanities.

For example:

A student who opts for a UG programme in Life Sciences will have the total credits to core courses distributed across (a) Botany, (b) Zoology and (c) Human Biology disciplines. The Degree will be

awarded as a Bachelor's in Life Sciences for a 3-year UG programme. For such a candidate, to pursue a Degree in the fourth year, he/she shall have to choose only one of the disciplines (either A, B or C) in which he/she has studied at least 6 DSCs and 5 DSEs of Core/Major courses in the first three years. The degree awarded will be Bachelor of Life Science (Honours/ or Honours with Research) in Botany (if chosen Botany) for a 4-year UG Programme.

5.1 At the initial stage of implementation of NEP 2020, students shall have the following Degree Options:

A. The 3-year UG Programme shall have two degree options:

i. Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary

ii. Single Core Discipline (Major)

- The students shall declare their Major and Minor, finally, at the end of the second semester.
- In both cases, the requirements of core and common courses remain the same.

B. The Four-year UG Programme shall have two degree options:

i. Honours

ii. Honours with Research

- Students with 3-year Degrees in the Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary programme will have to choose, in the fourth year, only one of the disciplines in which they have studied six DSCs and five DSEs in the first three years.
- Students with a 3-year undergraduate degree in a Single Core Discipline (Major) will pursue a fourth year in their Major discipline.

C. The other UG Programmes, including Double Major, will be initiated in a phased manner in due course of time.

Programme Components

Towards the attainment of holistic and multidisciplinary education, the HEI/College will offer courses from every Department before the commencement of each semester, listing the courses for Major, Minors, Discipline-Specific Electives, Multidisciplinary Studies, Ability Enhancement, Skill Enhancement, and Value Addition, along with the offering departments and course in-charges. This will enable students to select the courses of their choice. The students will then choose the courses of their choice from the list being offered, taking into account the requirements outlined in the curriculum of the degree they are pursuing.

The entire 3-year/4-year UG programme curriculum is divided into two parts: (a) Core Courses and (b) Common Courses, which are described below.

A. List of Core Courses

The core courses comprise Discipline-Specific, Discipline-Specific Elective (DSE), and Minor courses. All core courses have a credit allocation of 4. Altogether, irrespective of any significant or minor options, a student will necessarily need to study 23 courses with a total credit allocation of 92 over a 3-year programme. The degrees relevant to the core courses will be awarded.

i. Major Courses

Courses offered by a particular department for own students. The minimum credit requirement for a Single Core Discipline (Major) over 3 years is 64, which translates to 16 courses, including 5 DSEs.

ii. Minor Courses

One of the Major courses offered by the Department shall be treated as a Minor for students of other departments. The department may also offer a separate course or repeat the same course(s) as a Minor for students of other departments. The minimum credit requirement for a Minor Course over 3 years is 24, which translates to 6 courses.

B. List of Common Courses

As the name suggests, these courses must be studied by all students in the 3-year or 4-year undergraduate programme. Together, the common courses have a credit allocation of 36, divided over five subdivisions.

i. Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC): Total Credits 9

Courses offered by a particular department shall be considered multidisciplinary for students of other departments. A student cannot opt for an MDC catering to their Core Courses (Major and Minor). The student should be motivated to opt for a different subject each semester.

ii. Ability Enhancement Course (AEC): Total Credits 8

Courses on Language and Communication Skills, viz. English, Hindi, and Sanskrit

iii. Skill Enhancement Course(SEC): Total Credits 9

The HEI/College will identify the Skill Enhancement Courses to be offered in a semester, and students will choose the skill course of his/her choice from the courses offered.

iv. I/A/P/C/ (or Work-based Vocational Course*): Total credits 4

Internship/Apprenticeship/Minor Project/Community Outreach (I/A/P/C) or Work-based Vocational Courses are courses common to all students and will be carried out during the winter and summer terms/vacations. Although offered in the second semester, students may be encouraged to make their choice at the end of the first semester, allowing them to carry out activities during winter vacation as well.

*This course will not be offered in the first (beginning) academic session.

v) Value-Addition Course(VAC): Total 6 Credits

These are the course(s) common to all students to be offered as a VAC category in a particular semester. The HEI/College will assign one or more teachers to teach these courses as required, regardless of the teacher's background or qualifications.

28.1. Significant Notes

1. The prescribed credit weightage includes Lecture, Tutorial, and Practical components.
2. In the first semester, students will be offered three different subjects within the same stream: A, B, and C (Core and Minor are provided here for illustrative purposes only).
3. At the end of the second semester, each student may choose one of two programmes: the Multi-Disciplinary/Interdisciplinary or Single Core Discipline (Major) programme. The student choosing the latter will be required to give his/her Major and Minor at the end of the second semester. Such choices, including DSCs made at the end of the second semester, shall remain in effect until the VI semester.
4. Additional Seats: The Colleges may create 10% extra seats over and above the sanctioned strength to accommodate the request for a change of major. Any unfilled or vacant seats may be filled with those seeking a change of Major. Preference will be given to those with the highest CGPA and no arrears in the first year/semester.
5. The DSCs of another discipline for the first two semesters of students who opt for Major programmes will be treated as Minors.
6. A DSC offered in one discipline will be treated as a Minor by another. Students can choose Minor Courses from two different subjects, but must earn a minimum of 12 credits in each.
7. MDCs must be selected from a broad discipline/pool of MDCs other than Major and Minor subjects.
8. AEC/VAC/SEC-3 should be chosen from a pool of courses. Every discipline shall provide these courses, some of which will be offered discipline-specific, while the rest can be open to students of all other disciplines. However, the two SECs (SEC-1 & SEC-2) must be chosen from the discipline-specific (Core and Minor).
9. A maximum of two language courses can be opted for as Core and Minor. AECs should be in a language other than what is studied in DSCs/Minors.
10. I/A/P/C will be determined at the end of the first semester to enable students to carry out some I/A/P/C activities during winter vacation.
11. To pursue an Honour degree in the 4th year, students will have to choose only one discipline in both semesters, in which s/he have studied 6 DSCs and 5 DSEs in the first three years.
12. A student who secures 75% or more marks in aggregate till semester 6 (up to a 3-year degree) shall be eligible for a 4-year degree Honours with Research, provided HPU has approved the college to offer it.
13. One course per semester (DSC/Minor/MDC/SEC/etc) from a subject offered in two (or more) different programs (e.g. BCA and BSc/ BPA and BA/ BFA and BA/ Shastri and BA/etc) must be the same.
14. Students in the BA programmes can opt for only one DSC each from the Bachelor of Performing Arts (Dance, Music, Vocal & Instrument/Tabla/ etc.) and the Bachelor of Fine Arts (Painting/Applied Arts/Sculpture/ etc.).
15. Major and Minor shall be awarded on fulfilment of the following conditions: For Major, 64 credits in a 3-year & 84 credits in a 4-year UG programme in a single Major Discipline. For Minor 28 credits in 4-year UG programme in a single Minor Discipline
16. The Dissertation and Project will start in the VII semester. However, the evaluation and assessment will be conducted in both the VII and VIII semesters.

**As this scheme is being introduced for the first time, it is subject to modifications. Any changes applied in subsequent years after admission to the 1st Year will be retrospectively applicable.*

Examination & Grading System (NEP-2020)

Key Information

1. Registration of Students

All students admitted in affiliated colleges/institutions or through the Centre for Distance and Online Education (CDOE) must register with the University through the online registration portal. The concerned Principal/Head/Director shall ensure completion of registration within one month of admission.

- Registration is mandatory for appearing in examinations.
- Students are not permitted to appear in examinations in private capacity.
- Admission can be pursued either through Regular Mode or Distance Education Mode only.
- Creation of an Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) ID is compulsory before University registration.

2. Examination System

The University follows a **semester system** under NEP-2020 with:

- **Odd Semester Examinations:** October
- **Even Semester Examinations:** April

Students must fulfill attendance and academic requirements to become eligible for examinations.

2.1 Examination Form

The University notifies the examination form schedule at least 15 days before commencement of examinations.

- Examination forms must be verified by the college/institution/CDOE.
- Late submission is permitted with prescribed late fee.
- Students without valid admission are not allowed to appear in examinations.

2.2 Eligibility for Examinations

A student is eligible to appear in End Semester Examination (ESE) only if:

- Minimum **75% attendance** is maintained (relaxation as per University Ordinance).
- Continuous and Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE) requirements are fulfilled.
- Admit card has been issued.

Important Rules

- Students absent in ESE are treated as **Fail/Re-appear**.
- Re-appear examinations are conducted with the next odd/even semester examination only.

- Improvement examination is allowed twice within the maximum duration of the programme for improving division/classification.

2.3 Conduct of Examinations

Examinations are conducted according to University norms.

- Senior Superintendent/Superintendent appointed by the University supervises examinations.
- Flying squads inspect examination centres to ensure fairness.
- Strict disciplinary action is taken against use of unfair means.
- Facilities for Persons with Disabilities (PWD) are provided.

3. Evaluation System

Evaluation consists of:

1. **Continuous and Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE)**
2. **End Semester Examination (ESE)**
3. **Practical/Dissertation/Viva-Voce** (where applicable)

3.1 Continuous and Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE)

CCE includes:

- Attendance
- Mid-term/Class Tests
- Assignments
- Presentations/Seminars

CCE marks are uploaded online by the institution after verification.

For Distance Education (CDOE)

CCE is based on Tutor Marked Assignments (TMA):

3.2 End Semester Examination (ESE)

- Conducted by the University at the end of each semester.
- Students clearing minimum CCE requirements are eligible to appear.
- Students absent in theory/practical examination are considered failed in that course.
- Students may earn up to 40% credits through SWAYAM/MOOCs as per University guidelines.

4. Credit System and Distribution of Marks

The University follows the **Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)** under NEP-2020.

7. Re-checking and Re-evaluation

Students may apply for:

- **Re-checking** within 10 days of result declaration.
- **Re-evaluation** within 10 days (or up to 21 days with late fee).

Key provisions:

- Re-evaluation result supersedes original marks.
- If variation exceeds 10%, second re-evaluation is conducted.
- Re-evaluation does not provide retrospective benefits like merit position or scholarship claims.

8. Promotion Rules

- Students with “F” grade must re-appear in failed subjects.
- Promotion from odd to even semester is generally allowed.
- Promotion to next academic year requires passing at least **50% subjects** of preceding semesters together.
- Students failing in more than 50% subjects must seek readmission in that year.
- No special re-appear examinations are conducted.

9. Duration of Degree Programme

Regular Students

- UG degree must be completed within **7 years**.
- Gap between semesters should not exceed **3 years**.

Distance Education Students

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR ADMISSION TO BA/B.COM. / B.Sc.

1ST YEAR (Sem-1& 2) , 2ND YEAR & 3RD YEAR

A candidate who has passed in the Higher Secondary Examination (Academic Stream) conducted by the HP Board of School Education or an examination accepted as equivalent thereto by the various bodies of the HP University.

Provided that the candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with Arts/Humanities stream shall be given admission to the B.A. program. Provided that the candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with Commerce stream shall be given preference in admission to B.Com. program.

1. Age limit: - For first admission to the First Year of the Degree Course, the maximum age limit is 23 years for General category candidates, 25 years for Girl candidates as on 1st July, 2025. In case of SC/ST candidates, a relaxation of 3 years is applicable. The Vice Chancellor, H.P. University Shimla, may, in exceptional cases/ circumstances, to be recorded in writing, give relaxation in age up to a maximum of six months to the candidates. All such cases may be provisionally granted age relaxation up to six months by the principal of the college and a consolidated list of all such cases will be sent for approval of the Vice Chancellor by the 31st October of every academic year.

MINIMUM PERCENTAGE OF MARKS REQUIRED FOR ADMISSION IS AS UNDER: -

The students who have passed 10+2 Examination, or an examination accepted as being equivalent there to by H.P University, Shimla-5

- (i) B.A. (Pass Course): 33%
- (ii) B.A. (With Maths) : 45% (in aggregate or in Maths)
- (iii) B.Com. (Pass Course) : 45 % (35% for girls, 40% for students who have passed 10+2 with Commerce).
- (iv) B.Sc. (Pass Course): 45 %
- (v) Admission to 2nd Year & 3rd year will be on roll- on basis and will remain provisional till the declaration of the result of previous class or till further directions from H.P. Govt./H.P.

Note: 1. A candidate failing in either one or two subjects/papers will be given compartment in that subject/papers and will be eligible for promotion to the next class. He/she will appear in the subject/paper in which he/she got the compartment. He/she will have two chances (one at the supplementary stage and one at the annual stage), available to clear his/her compartment in subjects/papers. He/she will not be awarded the degree

until he/she clears all his/her courses within five years from the date of his/her admission to a particular course. A candidate failing in three or more subjects/papers will be treated as fail in that year and has to repeat the entire year.

Note: 2 As per norms and regulations of the University 7 10(c) there shall be a minor examination after completion of approximately 2/3 of the syllabus. Awards and copies of the above test have to be shown to students and the result has to be displayed on the notice board of the department/college. Students who do not qualify in IA/CCA can be given chance by the College for minor test and submission of assignments etc. As the University has given 1st and 2nd level verification to the college/ teacher concerned and Principal respectively, therefore, it shall be responsibility of the college to upload and verify the correct award. No correction/rectification shall be allowed once the awards have been verified by the Principal. Further, it is clarified that students shall be eligible to get the admit card if he/she has qualified in CCA/IA i.e., 35% minimum, but he/she shall have to score 40% and 45% aggregate Marks in annual system and semester system as the case may be (Final theory exams and CCA). If a candidate fails to score 40% / 45% Marks in aggregate he/she only have the option to appear in theory examination and CCA once uploaded and verified by the College shall not be subject to any change or improvement.

RESERVATION OF SEATS

Our institution follows the reservation policy of H.P. Government and H.P. University in admissions. The following reservations are available, which are filled according to the reservation roster devised by H.P. University:

These reservations will be applicable to those, who have passed their qualifying examination from H.P. Sports and cultural seats will be allotted to those events which are recognized by HPU sports and co-curricular council. 6. Students are advised to pay their dues personally on notified dates, failing which his/her claim for admission stands forfeited and seat(s) so vacated will be allotted to the next candidate in merit. Fees and funds once deposited will not be refunded.
7. Registration fee will not be charged from a student who migrates from other college if he/she is already registered with HP university.

CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS)

Bachelor Courses:

B.A, II. B. Com, III. B.Sc.

Outlines of Choice Based Credit System:

1. Core Course: Four discipline specific papers each for regular courses and two papers each for English and Hindi/MIL (B.A./B. Com): The papers under this category are going to be taught uniformly across all universities with 30% deviation proposed in the draft. The purpose of fixing core papers is to ensure that all the institutions follow a minimum common curriculum so that each institution/university adheres to common minimum standard. Also the course designed for papers under this category aim to cover the basics that a student is expected to imbibe in that particular discipline. A course, which is studied by a candidate as a core requirement is termed as a Core course.

2. Elective Course: Generally a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/ subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course.

(i) Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Course (2 each for regular courses): Elective courses offered under the main discipline/subject of study are referred to as Discipline Specific Elective course. The list provided under this category are suggestive in nature and each University has complete freedom to suggest their own papers under this category based on their expertise, specialization, requirements, scope and need. The University/Institute may also offer discipline related Elective courses of interdisciplinary nature (to be offered by main discipline/subject of study).

(ii) Generic Elective (GE) Course: (2 each for B.A. /B. Com. regular courses): An elective Course chosen from an unrelated discipline/subject, with an intention to seek exposure beyond discipline/s of choice is called a Generic Elective. The purpose of this category of papers is to offer the students the option to explore disciplines of interest beyond the choices they make in Core and Discipline Specific Elective papers. The list provided under this category are suggestive in nature and each University has complete freedom to suggest their own papers under this category based on

their expertise, specialization, requirements, scope and need.

P.S.: A core course offered in a discipline/subject may be treated as an elective by other Discipline/subject and vice versa and such electives may also be referred to as Generic Elective.

3. Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC): The Ability Enhancement (AE) Courses may be of two kinds: Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC). “AECC” courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to knowledge enhancement; i). Environmental Science and English/Hindi/MIL Communication. These are mandatory for all disciplines. SEC courses are value-based and/or skill-based and are aimed at providing hands-on-training, competencies, skills, etc.

4. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC): (4 for regular courses): These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based knowledge and should contain both theory and lab/hands-on/training/field work. The main purpose of these courses is to provide students life-skills in hands-on mode so as to increase their employability. The list provided under this category is suggestive in nature and each University has complete freedom to suggest their own papers under this category based on their expertise, specialization, requirements, scope and need.

5. Practical/tutorials: (One each with every core and discipline/generic specific elective paper): The list of practical provided is suggestive in nature and each university has the freedom to add/subtract/edit practical from the list depending on their faculty and infrastructure available. Addition will however be of similar nature.

CREDIT SCHEME

1. An Undergraduate degree in Humanities/ Social Sciences/ Commerce may be awarded if a student completes 4 core courses each in two disciplines of choice, 2 core courses each in English and Hindi/MIL respectively, 2 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC), minimum 4 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), 2 courses each from a list of Discipline Specific Elective courses based on the two disciplines of choice selected above, respectively, and two courses from the list of Generic Electives courses.
2. For the purpose of computation of work-load the following mechanism may be adopted:
 - i) 1 Credit = 1 Theory period of one hour duration per week
 - ii) 1 Credit = 1 Tutorial period of one hour duration per week
 - iii) 1 Credit = 1 Practical period of two-hour duration per week

IMPORTANT INSTRUCTIONS

- (a) A candidate shall also be required to fulfill the following conditions to appear in the annual examinations: -
- 75% attendance is compulsory in theory and practical.
 - 75% attendance is mandatory in seminars and submission of assignments.
 - It shall be compulsory to score minimum 50% marks in aggregate in House examination.
 - It shall also be mandatory to participate in activities of subject societies.
 - The University annual examination forms shall be treated as provisional unless and until the eligibility criteria mentioned above for appearing in annual examination is fulfilled by the candidate and a certificate to this effect is received from the Principal of the concerned College at least 15 days prior to the start of annual/ practical examination.
- (b) Apart from compulsory subjects, the subject combinations and number of seats shall be decided by the College concerned.

For determining the CCA of a student enrolled for the Academic session will account for 30 % of the total marks i.e. 100. The break up to 30% marks is given below:-

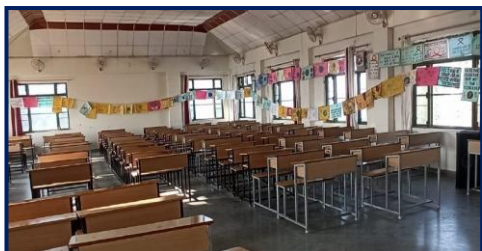

- 5 marks for attendance
- 5 marks for class test to be taken on completion of 40% syllabus by the class teacher.
- 10 marks for unit/ house test to be taken on completion of 75% of syllabus.
- 10 marks for assignment, tutorials, general behavior of student.

CLASS ROOM ATTENDANCE INCENTIVES

Those having greater than 75% attendance (for those participating in co-curricular activities, 25% will be added to percent Attendance) will be awarded CCA marks as follows:

MIGRATION RULES

1. To apply for Migration, a student must apply online for the same through the RME Portal of HP University, Shimla. The Migration request will have to be verified by the Principals of the concerned colleges before it is approved by the University. Migration from other college to Govt. Degree College, Dhama at 16 Mile, District Shimla and vice-versa is governed by HPU rules.
2. No migration certificate can be issued unless the student is registered with University. A migrating student will not be admitted to the college if the subject/ courses studied by him/her previously are not available in the college.
3. The migrating student must submit the following documents/information:
 - i Lecture attendance statement (of all subjects offered)
 - ii Statement of credits earned by the students under CCA
 - iii Character certificate from the Principal of the college last attended.
4. After migration has been sanctioned and notified by the HPU, the student must join the second college within the time period stipulated by the HPU.
5. The college first joined is entitled to the tuition fee for the month in which the University sanctions the migration. The second college is not entitled to the tuition fee for the month or part thereof.
6. The admission of the students migrating from another University or from an affiliated college or institution in the same course (including ICDEOL) shall be governed by the regulations framed by the Executive Council of HPU from time to time.
7. The admission of the student migrating from another University shall be treated as provisional and shall be confirmed when he/she produces the migration certificate issued by the University and a certificate of good conduct issued by the Head of the Institution last attended.
8. A student disqualified by another University shall not be given admission during the period of the disqualification.

The Scholarships /Concessions available are:

1. Post -Matriculation Scholarship for SC/ST students whose parents annual income does not exceed Rs 2,50,000.
2. Post-Matric scholarship for students belonging to minorities whose income is below 200,000/- (Rupees two lakh) per annum and marks not less than 50 per cent.
3. Indira Gandhi *Utkrisht Chhatrvriti Yojana* for Post 10 +2 students : the scholarship under this shall be awarded to 10 male toppers each from merit list of 10+2 (Arts, Science and Commerce)@ of 10,000 per annum.
4. **Post +2 Scholarship scheme:** Under this scheme the first 100 students from the merit list of 10+2 class supplied by the HP board of School Education, Dharamshala will be selected provided they join the first year of the degree course
5. **Maharishi Valmiki scholarship for girls:** This scholarship is meant for girls who belong to the Valmiki family and whose parents are engaged in unclean profession, the amount for the same is Rs 9000/- per annum.
6. **IRDP/BPL scholarship scheme:** The student who belongs to IRDP/BPL families may apply for this scholarship with required documents. A sum of Rs. 1200/- per annum is provided as financial assistance.
7. **Govt. of India Scholarship for Handicapped students:** This scholarship is available to the physically handicapped students only through HP Welfare department.

8. **Soldier Board Scholarship:** The children of Ex-servicemen may apply for this scholarship to the District Soldiers' Board. The prescribed form can be obtained from the office of this board/ college office.
9. **Scholarship for children of Army personnel Martyred/Disabled during war:** Eligible students may apply to the District Soldier's Board through the head of the Institution. The amount of scholarship is Rs 1200/- per annum.
10. **Kalpna Chawala Chatrvriti :** State scholarship for the 2000 meritorious +2 girls students of all study groups named Kalpna Chawala Chatrvriti Yojana has been started from 2012-13 onwards. The deserving candidates will be awarded a scholarship of Rs. 15,000/- per student per annum.
11. **Prime Minister Scholarship Scheme:** Available for eligible students who are unable to attain higher education due to financial crises. This scholarship scheme is available through online portal of the Govt. of India.
12. **COVID crisis support Scholarship scheme:** This scheme will be available to those students who have lost one or both parents due to COVID -19 through online portal of the Govt. of India.

PAYMENT OF FEE

1. Tuition fee shall be charged for 12 months (June to May) as per schedule.
2. Fee and other charges are to be paid (without fine) on the dates fixed by the office for each class notified from time to time. Those who pay the college dues after the dates fixed for their class will have to pay the fine for the delay.
3. Fee, fine and other dues once paid, will not be refunded.
4. The students who do not pay their dues as by the due dates will be charged Rs. 10/- per day as the late fee and as per the schedule fixed by the College/ University from time to time.
5. Tuition fee from the following students will not be charged:
 - i. Girls students.
 - ii. Among real brothers/sisters, only one will be exempted.
 No fee/funds will be charged from students with special need with more than 40 percent disability upon the production of medical certificate as per DHE, HP letter no. EDN-H(8) B (15)- HPU-15/2013 dated 01.02.2020
6. Bank charges/commission payable if any, for online deposit of fee shall be borne by the candidate.

The College will have a CSCA constituted as per HPU rules and regulations in force from time to time.

COLLEGE IDENTITY CARD

Once the admission of a student to the college is confirmed, he/she should collect his/her identity card from the college office/the Librarian well in time as per the schedule notified by the office/Librarian. It is compulsory for all the students to carry the college identity card with them daily and to produce it for verification as and when demanded by the college authorities. The loss of identity card must be reported immediately to the college authorities. One has to file an FIR in order to get a duplicate I-Card on payment of Rs. 20/- within one week.

PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION (PTA)

The College has constituted the Parents Teachers Association from the Session 2016-17. Every student is supposed to contribute Rs. 600/- P.A. towards PTA. Parent-Teachers Association has been formed in the college with the avowed object of promoting participation of parents in the developmental activities of the College. Their presence and valuable suggestions are eagerly solicited by the staff in PTA meetings. Elections to the general body of the PTA are held at the start of academic session every year. The executive body comprises the following members:

1. Principal of the College- Patron of the body.
2. Parents or Guardians (only those who have blood relation with the students studying in the college.)
3. Teachers.

LEAVE RULES

It is compulsory for all the students to get their leave sanctioned before proceeding on any kind of leave.

1. For leave on medical ground, the student will be required to submit a medical certificate in case the leave is for more than a week's duration.
2. Leave up to one week will be sanctioned by the concerned teacher. For leave extending more than one week's duration, the student shall have to apply to the principal.
3. A student will not be allowed to avail more than ten days leave during the entire academic session, except under exceptional circumstance.
4. If a student remains absent for ten days continuously without information, his/her name will be struck off from the rolls of the college.
5. Even if a student is on leave, he/she will have to deposit his/her fee as per the scheduled date decided by the college.

LIBRARY RULES

1. All the students on the rolls of the College shall be eligible to become members of the College Library.
2. Every student is entitled to draw two books for reading at home for a period of 30 days from the library.
3. The borrower shall be solely responsible for the safety/preservation of the books drawn by him/her.
4. A fine of Rupee 1/- per day will be charged beyond due date of submission of the book from the defaulter students.
5. In case a book is found mutilated, torn, defaced or misplaced the actual cost of the book plus 20% of the original cost will be charged from such defaulter student.
6. Reference books are to be consulted in library only.

RE-ADMISSION

Students can seek re-admission twice during the session. First re-admission will be allowed within ten days after the name is struck off after paying a fine of Rs. 100/- and a fine of Rs. 200/- will be charged for the second re-admission within ten days after the name is struck off from the rolls. No student will be allowed to seek admission after two times of re-admission.

COLLEGE RULES FOR STRICT COMPLIANCE

1. The principal and the members of the staff have the power to take disciplinary action against students indulged in act of indiscipline, which may lead to imposing fine, or suspension, rustication or expulsion of the guilty student.
2. Students are directed to switch off their mobiles as and when they enter Class rooms. Playing music and songs on mobile phones is strictly prohibited. Student found indulging in it will be penalized.
3. The prior approval of the college authorities to organize the function /activity in the college campus, is required.
4. Pasting of unauthorized posters in the college, writing on the wall, blackboards and notice board is strictly prohibited.
5. A student bringing along an outsider in the college campus will be severely punished. Outsiders are not allowed to roam about in the college campus.
6. Roaming about in the campus, corridors and outside classrooms during vacant periods and causing disturbance to work in this manner is highly undesirable and will be considered an act of indiscipline.
7. Damage of any kind to college property including defacement of walls, damage to furniture, etc. is an act of indiscipline.
8. Use of Alcohol and drugs is strictly prohibited. Any student found indulged in it will be penalized.
9. Smoking chewing of tobacco/gutka is strictly prohibited and any infringement may entail a fine of rupees 100/-.
11. It is mandatory for all the students to carry their identity cards daily to the college. The loss of the card should be reported through FIR immediately.

GRIEVANCES AND REDRESSAL MECHANISM

1. The students will have the right to make an appeal against any component of evaluation. Such appeal has to made to the Principal of the College on a prescribed form and should clearly state in writing the reason(s) for the complaint/appeal.
2. The appeal will be placed before the grievance Redressal committee (GRC), Chaired by the college Principal for cases pertaining the core/elective/generic courses.
3. Any other type of grievance may be heard by the said committee.

RAGGING- A PUNISHABLE OFFENCE

PROHIBITION OF RAGGING UNDER H.P. EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS ACT

(PROHIBITION OF RAGGING ACT , 2009) defines 'Ragging' as doing any act, by disorderly conduct, to a student of an educational institution, which causes or is likely to cause physical or psychological harm or raising apprehension or fear or shame or embarrassment to the student. Such disorderly conduct includes, teasing or abusing or playing practical jokes on or causing hurt to such students or asking a student to do any act or perform something which such student, will not be willing to do in the ordinary course.

A student who commits the offence of ragging shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to three years or shall also be liable to a fine which may extend to Rs. 50,000 or both.

If a student is convicted of the charges of committing, abetting, participating or propagating ragging, he shall be dismissed from the college and such student will not get admission in other colleges for a period of three years from the date of his dismissal from the college.
